



LGBTQ+ Mental Health

- LGBTQ+ young people are more than 4X more likely to attempt suicide than their peers
- The Trevor project estimates that for LGBTQ+ young people,
 there is at least one suicide attempt every 45 seconds
- In Comprehensive Health Needs Assessment, only ¹/₃
 LGBTQ+ respondents reported getting treatment
- The minority stress theory attributes these disparities to stigma, prejudice, and anticipation of discrimination

Loss of Resources at Federal Level

- 988 Suicide and Crisis Lifeline
 - Specialized service for LGBTQ+ youth was ended in July 2025
- \$1 billion cut from 2022 Bipartisan Safer
 Communities Act
 - Funding used by school districts to hire mental health professionals, such as counselors and social workers
 - Funding lost in May 2025



Loss of Resources at State Level

- Ohio Senate 1 Bill and closure of LGBTQ+ Center at University of Cincinnati (June 2025)
 - Banned state colleges from implementing DEI programs
 - Led to closures:
 - LGBTQ+ Center
 - Women's Center
 - African American Cultural and Resource Center
 - Ethnic Programs and Services
- House Bill 68 enacted in 2024
 - Banned gender-affirming care for minors, including puberty blockers, hormone therapy, and gender-affirming surgeries
 - Disproportionate impact of transgender youth in Ohio, including mental health



Mental Health Impact

"It's been super exhausting lately. Some days, I'm just totally anxious and can barely get out of bed. It feels like there's a new anti-trans rule coming at us every single day, and I seriously need a break from all this.

What Can You Do?

- Launch a local hotline specifically for LGBTQ+
 residents who need someone to turn to
- Offer immediate crisis support while also connecting people to affirming community resources
- Empower the LGBTQ+ City Commission (est March 2025) to guide and sustain this effort



Impact of LGBTQ+ Specific Helpline

Provide a highly **accessible mental health resource**, tailored to the needs of LGBTQ+ individuals

Connect callers directly to local support groups, encouraging community-building and **social connection**

Partner with existing LGBTQ+ organizations in Cincinnati to maximize **longevity and feasibility** of this endeavor while strengthening the support these groups can provide
